



BASKET WEAVE 12" BLOCK For COMMUNITY SERVICE QUILTS



(Pattern from Quilters Cache. Direct link to block: <http://tinyurl.com/k885g5u>.)

From light fabric, cut 3 strips 1½" by Width of Fabric
From dark fabric, cut 3 strips 1½" by Width of Fabric

1. Sew strips together.



2. Press seams toward dark fabric.
3. Cut 3½" sections to make 16 units.
4. Sew rows, then sew rows together make block. Sew scant ¼" seams. Blocks finish at 12½".

FABRIC EXCHANGE

There are only 3 months left to sign up for 2015 and then the list will be closed. There has been a wonderful response to next year's colors, so don't miss out on this fun way to build your strip stash. Keep your eyes out for new strip patterns to share with everyone too. Quilt shops are having sales and quilt shows will be starting soon, where there are wonderful opportunities to buy your fabric at great prices. You will need 2½ yards of fabric for the 28 available spots. So don't wait too long to sign up.

FABRIC EXCHANGE for 2014 - Beautiful Batiks!! - 100% cotton fabric. Quilt shop quality, please! Your fabric must be prewashed and pressed.

Size: ACCURATELY cut strips 2½" by width of fabric. **1½ yards of fabric**, after having been washed, pressed and straightened, should yield enough strips. Bring your strips in a zip lock bag with your name on it. Come with one shade and go home with a wonderful mix of the color of the month. I usually do 2-3 different fabrics so I double my treasure, double my stash, double my fun!!!

2014 Colors (Batiks)

Oct: Light Teals / Aqua

Nov: Pastel/Marbled

Dec: Dark Pink

2015 (More Batiks!)

I am upping the list to 28 people and 2 yards of fabric from this year's 21 people and 1.5 yards. Everyone seems really excited about the strips each month when they come. So glad this is going over well.

Cut 28 strips, then fold them in quarters, stack them up and put them in a large gallon size zip lock bag with your name on it. Bring one pattern / print of the color for that month and go home with a **wonderful mix** of that colors just waiting for you to stroke, cuddle and dream with. Some participants purchase and cut up 6 months' worth in advance or even enough for the whole year. **SO here are the colors for 2015:** Cut this out, put this in your shopping wallet, I phone note pad or wherever so you have it with you when you on your shopping excursions or travels. Look for sales, quilt shop specials, web sites and more and let us know about them also.

February: Lime Green (a great big hit last year)

March: Raspberry

April: Orange

May: Yellow

June: Pink (light or dark shades)

July: Greens

August: Burgundy / Maroon

September: Red

October: Aqua

November: Purple / Violet

December: Light Blues

PROFILE – MAGELLA SAUVE

OUR HOSPITALITY LADY

Magella is a busy lady and lives a very interesting life. She was born and raised in Remford, Maine, number eleven of twelve siblings. She lived in Maine for 24 years, attended three years of college there, then married and moved to Montreal, Canada. Her husband was Canadian, came to Maine on vacation, met Magella and the rest is history. She worked for the Hudson Bay Company while in Canada. They lived in Canada and Maine before moving to Florida. and were married for 40 years before he died of cancer in 2001.

Magella's mother died at the age of 50. Two of her siblings are still living, a brother up in Maine and a sister in Coral Gables. Her younger sister died a year ago out in Utah.

When they moved to Miami in the mid-1970's they bought a small house in the Shenley Park area near Miami Children's Hospital. Her husband added on to it and it is now about twice the original size. He was a civil engineer and they built bus shelters. Magella was a housewife. They raised three children, one girl and two boys, who are all college educated. Two of her children live in the Atlanta area, her daughter, Angela, works at Stone Mountain Park and her son, Paul, works on computers in Atlanta. Her youngest son, Mark, and family live in Cooper City. His wife is from Ecuador and he is self-employed. They have given Magella three grandchildren, a boy, ten, and twin girls age nine. Magella says they are all so busy she doesn't get to see them very often.

As a long-time Volunteer at Fairchild Gardens, she met Bess Borkowski who told her about Ocean Waves. Magella joined Ocean Waves about 6 years ago. She has always loved crafts and making things. Her first taste of quilting came when her sisters let her help tie a log cabin quilt when she was 'just a kid' up in Maine. The log cabin is still her favorite pattern. Her favorite part of quilting is choosing the fabrics. She does not belong to a small quilt group, but sews the binding on most of the quilts produced by Gerry's Monday Sewers and has for years. This fall she is part of the Shoe Box Swap.

Magella is a busy lady – she goes to exercise class five days a week. She says it's like having a job, going out every day. She really enjoys the Silver Sneakers program and the people in it.

One thing we did not know, when her children were small she taught swimming classes during the summers.

She says she loves being with people and that shows when she is working at our hospitality tables at Ocean Waves meetings. We thank you, Magella, for being so special and sharing your life with all of us.

5. Suggestion box – one suggestion so far, need more.
6. Sharon Krutulis announced our visitor today - Sister Claire from Charleston, S.C.
7. April Atlas – Program for today is Games – Bingo, Bunko, Strip Blackjack! December will be gift exchange for Educate Tomorrow, kids who have aged out of the Foster Care system who have kids of their own. These will be for babies, toddlers and early school, age five and under. Bring baby quilts or toys or gifts (baskets, pillow cases. Will start collecting in November and due by December meeting. Have to be new. October will be White Elephant Sale – no charge for tables. Four tables left. Bring Ca\$h.

12. Newsletter announcement - Arlene Goldberg will be resigning newsletter as of January and Leslie Pope has volunteered to take the position.
13. Phyllis Salt – Sunshine Lady – Cathy Viar recovering from minor surgery and taking it easy today.
14. Molly Gonzalez and Yvonne Emmanuelli reported on luncheon details so far. The Luncheon is January 17th at the Elks Lodge on Sunset and 103rd Ave, starting at 10 a.m. There will be a Quilt Challenge and Guest speaker. Ticket price will be \$35. There will also be a Hat Challenge with anyone and everyone making a fun hat- no requirements- can be themed, fun, name, old time favorite. The Luncheon theme is “Things Women Do”.
15. Diane Miller thanked the Guild for the \$1,000 donation she will be taking to Panama to help buy sewing machines for Peace Corp projects her daughter is involved in. Diane is taking pictures today to take with her and will bring back more for us to see her working with this group.
16. Lois Erickson – our Quilter of the Year, 2014 is looking for nominations for this year’s Quilter of the Year. She also explained the Luncheon Quilt Challenge which is also themed “What Women Do”. The rule is the perimeter must not be more that 100” around. Lois announced that she moved her shop in August and all are welcomed to come and visit the new area (8924 SW 129th St). Eddie has his area there and will be working on machines until Wednesday.
17. Molly Gonzalez announced that the Sewing Guild will be meeting October 4th to sew for homeless shelter (pillow cases, duffle bags, PJ bottoms) Anyone can volunteer at Winston Park Clubhouse (80th St and 132nd Ave) at 9 a.m. until 4 p.m. Bring lunch. Kits will be furnished. Bring sewing machine or serger your choice
18. Mary Ann Ericson has requested quilts to sell at the Harvest Festival, she has a table. She also announced that the Youth Fair coming up in 2015 will not have quilts or a sewing section this year
19. Barbara announced that this Adult Day Care facility will be closing and moving by November 1st. Sunrise has offered us the choice of two facilities to continue to holding our meetings. A) Gerry & Bud Tucker and Barbara were able to tour one facility so far at 152nd St. and 120th Ave across from the zoo. It is not new but very nice with lovely and accommodating workers. It is also an Adult Day Care. It has kitchen facilities including an ice machine. Storage would be in a locked training room. Already has large TV we can use for our videos and demos. 
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
